When: Saturday, May 11th

Time: 9 am at Thousand Trails' entrance gate. If you

show up after 9:30 am, you might not get in

Cost: Approximately \$6 per vehicle. If you camp there

overnight, you don't have to pay the fee.

Where: Thousand Trails Campground, 2555 US Hwy. 17 South, Wauchula, FL 33873 - about one mile south of downtown Wauchula on the left (east) side of the road. If you get to Pioneer Park, you've gone too far.

We'll have hot dogs and the fixings, along with paper plates and utensils. Please bring a side dish-salad, chips, dessert, fruit - to share at the cookout. Please bring your own drinks as well. (NO alcohol)

Note: You must call one of the Dave's before Friday, the 10th so they will know to expect you.

What to Bring

Necessities:

- -Shovel
- -Sifter*
- -Shoes that you can wear in the water- no sandals. Wear ones that will stay on your feet such as dive boots, water shoes or old gym shoes. I find socks that are tight around the ankles are good for keeping gravel out.
- -Fanny pack for putting fossils in. A small backpack or a bag tied to you will also work.
- -Containers to put your fossils in to take home. Some may be fragile; a bucket for large items.
- -Dry clothes to change into and a towel.
- -Drinks and snacks.
- -Sunscreen and a hat- the sun is intense this time of year.
- -Chairs for cookout
- -Bug repellent

Options:

-Canoe or kayak - we will be at a place where we can walk into the river but you may want to find a place further from the "pack"
-Camera (waterproof)

Do's and Don'ts

Do: Hunt for fossils (have your fossil permit), fish (make sure you have your license with you), swim, take pictures of the wildlife, check the water level via the link on our website before you go Don't: Dig into the banks undermining trees, collect any Native American artifacts, throw trash into the river or on shore.

If You Bring Your Kids...

This can be a wonderful family adventure and great opportunity for your kids to hunt and FIND real fossils. These are just some recommendations to make the experience enjoyable for all of you.

If you have young children (about 8 and under)

- there should be one adult for each child
- please be sure they have life jackets on while they are in the river
- they get hungry and tired quickly...bring snacks and something for them to rest on the shore with

For any children

- they must have shoes... there is broken glass in the river
- experienced members of the club will be there to help you get started and offer advice but your kids will probably still need your help in hunting

Florida Fossil Permit

Go to www.flmnh.ufl.edu/vertpaleo/vppermit.htm

The permit costs \$5 per person and takes about 3 weeks to process.

*Sifter: anything that has 1/4" screen will do. The easiest to work with are approx. 1 ft. x 2 ft. wooden boxes fitted with screening. Tie "fun-doodle" floats to them to keep them from sinking while you fill them. It's important to have the screen tied to you with a length of rope so your finds don't float down the river. The alternative is to have

a partner that holds the sifter while you shovel in gravel.

Girl Discovers Dinosaur Fossils:

New Species Vectidraco Daisymorrisae Named After 5-Year-Old Daisy Morris March 22, 2013 11:18 AM EDT



In 2008, a little girl discovered dinosaur fossils during a family walk along the Atherfield Beach on the southern coast of the Isle of Wight. A remarkable event for young Daisy Morris, she was just 5 years old when she unearthed the newly discovered dinosaur species.

According to reports, Daisy was enjoying a family walk along the beach in England's Isle of Wight, also known as the "dinosaur capital of Great Britain," when she identified fossils specimens in the mud.

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
"She has a very good eye for tiny little fossils," her mother Sian Morris told BBC.


Daisy apparently first began fossil hunting at age 3.

"She found these tiny little black bones sticking out of the mud and decided to dig a bit further and scoop them all out," her mother said.

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

The family brought the mysterious specimens to the attention of fossil expert Martin Simpson of Southampton University.

"When Daisy and her family brought the fossilized remains to me in April 2009, I knew I was looking at something very special," said Simpson.

After several years of thorough analysis by paleontologists Darren Naish and Gareth Dyke, the findings on the fossils were finally published on Monday. Daisy Morris is now 9 years old.

The specimen is a previously unknown genus and species of a small flying reptile called the pterosaur. Experts officially named the specimen Vectidraco Daisymorrisae after Daisy. About the size of a crow, the pterosaur fossil was dated back to the Lower Cretaceous period, or approximately 115 million years ago.




"It's likely that if she had not picked this up, it would have washed away that day and might never have been found," said fossil expert Martin Simpson.

"It shows how amateurs and academics can work together and make some really important discover-

"She is a fascinating and unique girl.

"The fossil turned out to be a completely new genus and species of small pterosaur, a flying reptile from 115 million years ago in the Lower Cretaceous period, which because of the island's eroding coastline, would without doubt have been washed away and destroyed if it had not been found by Daisy."



The Mammals Lulu Creek - Part 13

While screen washing for for shark teeth at Lulu Creek through the years, I found a little mammal material. Modern animals that we have domesticated and forest animals familiar to us. Often jaws of Opossums and other medium-sized animals would turn up, as in any creek throughout the State. As animals are drawn to water to drink or find food, eventually some will die or fall prey to others. 90% of the mammals at Lulu fall into this category.

As we roll back time a little further, a few animals that we'd recognize would have lived there.... horse, bison, wolves, and camels, for example. Some of these could have come with the early settlers or been here when they arrived. The teeth are not fully mineralized. Many of these animals go back into Florida's rich past, even before Lulu Creek formed.

The strangest land animal found at Lulu was the four-tusked gomphotherium, an early elephant. What other early mammals are left to be found?



Sharks are my thing.




